

OUR PROJECT AREAS 2022 - 2023



01 Comprehensive and Inclusive Eye Care Programme

In Zambia, the prevalence of blindness is estimated to be 1.1% in the general population and 2% in those aged 50 years and above giving an estimate of 389,200 blind people within an estimated population of 19.46 million (National Eye Health Strategic Plan - Zambia 2022-2026). Over 80% of all cases of blindness are preventable, treatable, and curable. The major causes of blindness include Cataract, Glaucoma, Trachoma, Refractive Errors, Corneal Opacities and diabetic eye diseases of which 50% is due to cataract (Lindfield,2012 and Bozanni,2014). Our Comprehensive and Inclusive Eye Care Programme is tackling the barriers and causes of blindness through enhancing diagnostic and curative capacity.

02 Trachoma Elimination Programme

Trachoma is the one of the leading infectious cause of blindness worldwide. It is caused by a bacterium called *Chlamydia trachomatis* and is one of the known Neglected Tropical Disease (NTDs). In Zambia, Trachoma is a disease of public health concern and was endemic in 44 (now 54) districts at baseline putting at risk of visual impairment and blindness of a population of over 7 million people. LIAZ is working with the Ministry of Health (MOH) and other partners in implementing the SAFE (Surgery, Antibiotic, Facial and Environmental Cleanliness) strategy and further conducting surveys and operational research to inform programmatic decision making to eliminate Trachoma.

03 Expanding Diabetes Services in Kafue & Chilanga Districts

NonCommunicable Diseases (NCDs) are a significant health problem in Zambia. The age-standardised mortality rate across four major NCDs (Cardiovascular Disease, Chronic Respiratory Disease, Cancer and Diabetes) was 938 per 100,000 in males and 599 in females in 2021. The Expanding Diabetes Services in Kafue and Chilanga Districts aims to support the MOH reduce incidence of NCDs with a focus on Diabetes.

04 Non - Eye Health Programmes

Our Non-Eye Health Programmes support communities in health and education, focusing on general health awareness, disease prevention, and access to healthcare services. Additionally, we empower individuals through literacy programs, school infrastructure development, and educational resources, aiming to make a meaningful impact on holistic development and quality of life.



PROGRAMMES OVERVIEW

PERFORMANCE



COMPREHENSIVE & INCLUSIVE EYE CARE PROGRAMME

The Comprehensive and Inclusive Eye Care programme aims to enhance the delivery of eye health services at primary and secondary level hospitals. This is achieved through enhancing human resource capacity by providing scholarships, Continuous Medical Education (CME), provision of appropriate technology (diagnostics and curative equipment and instrument), sensitizing and raising awareness of the community and the provision of medical commodities used to offer free eye services. The overall goal is to prevent avoidable blindness and promote the rights of those who are blind or visually impaired so they could live an independent life.

This year, we continued to support these efforts in Luapula Province under the Luapula Comprehensive Eye Care project 2020 – 2025 covering 8 districts. We further expanded the programme through the launch of the Central Province Comprehensive Eye Care project in Central Province covering 6 districts. These projects are supported by Lions Clubs International Foundation, Pyott Foundation and Lions Clubs International Multiple District 104E Norway.

HUMAN RESOURCE

We awarded scholarships to four (4) health workers from Luapula Province to study a Diploma in Ophthalmic Nursing (DON) course at Sheikh Zayed Eye Care Centre in the Gambia. Additionally, four others from Central Province were sponsored in 2023 to undertake the same course at the same institution. We further supported a refresher training of one ophthalmologist in Manual Small-Incision Cataract Surgery (MSICS) and one Biomedical Equipment Technician in "Instrument Maintenance for Technicians" both from Mansa General Hospital held at Aravind Eye Hospital in India. Furthermore, we supported the training of four ophthalmic staff members as trainers of trainers for Primary Eye Care. These trainers subsequently trained 186 frontline health workers from primary health facilities in Luapula and Central Province, contributing to enhanced eye care service delivery.

SERVICE DELIVERY

A total of 17,800 were screened and treated in the 16 districts of Luapula and Central Provinces. We facilitated 20 surgical outreach camps, where a total of 988 sight-restoring surgeries, primarily cataract surgeries, were performed.

COMPREHENSIVE & INCLUSIVE EYE CARE PROGRAMME

INFORMATION AND PUBLICITY

To ensure enhance knowledge and alley myths various information sharing, and publicity methods were used.

We held awareness meetings with traditional and civic leaders to ensure they were well acquainted and became advocates of the programme in their respective communities. We also supported airing of radio programs. The programs featured health workers who explained the various eye conditions, treatment, and prevention. The programs also featured cataract champions who gave testimony of how their lives had changed after undergoing surgery. Additionally, the champions encouraged others with similar conditions to seek health services from qualified health institutions. Working in collaboration with the MOH and other partners we developed Information, Education and Communication (IEC) materials. These were printed in English and local language and placed in centers of population aggregation. Further, we commemorated the World Sight Day during which we advocated for prioritization of eye health services through increased budget allocation.

TRACHOMA ELIMINATION PROGRAMME

LIAZ continued to support interventions to eliminate Trachoma in the period under review. Following the conclusion of the number of rounds of treatment which culminated into treatment of over 1.02 million people in the previous years, a National Review meeting on Neglected Tropical Diseases (NTDs) was convened. The meeting reviewed activities conducted in all the endemic NTDS and progress towards elimination. It further reviewed and updated the trachoma elimination dossier. The meeting held in Lusaka brought together researchers, implementing partners and government representatives of relevant line ministries and agencies.

Furthermore, we supported the MOH in the development of the protocol for the “Modified Approach in Trachoma Surveys in Zambia” in collaboration with the Centre for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) USA, Tropical Data, International Trachoma Initiative, and the University of Zambia Veterinary laboratory. The study spearheaded by the Coalition for Neglected Tropical disease and World Health Organisation, is aimed at determining the factors influencing persistent Trachoma. The study to be conducted in 5 countries across Africa will avail valuable data to enhance programmatic decision making and ensure Trachoma is eliminated in Zambia and the world over.

EXPANDING DIABETES SERVICES IN KAFUE & CHILANGA DISTRICTS

The Expanding Diabetes Services in Kafue and Chilanga Districts was launched in June 2023. The project encompasses three main objectives. Firstly, to promote awareness on prevention, care, and management of diabetes and screen 41,600 individuals in Chilanga and Kafue Districts. Secondly, to enhance the delivery of diabetes services in both districts through the renovation and equipping of two clinics, along with the training of health workers in diabetes management. Lastly, to deliver the project effectively and efficiently within set guidelines and regulations. The project is structured into four major components: service delivery, human resources, equipment and instruments, and advocacy and awareness raising. Under service delivery, activities include screening and managing 20,000 diabetes cases at static facilities, screening and managing 21,600 diabetes cases during outreach, conducting 72 outreach/screening events, and referring diabetes patients for further management.

During the period we procured and donated consumables to the districts. We conducted 5 outreach events and screened 362 people. We further held several awareness events through radio, public address system and door to door.

NON-EYE HEALTH PROGRAMMES

CHAMULIMBA HEALTH CENTER COMMISSIONING

On September 23rd, 2022, a significant milestone was achieved with the official opening of the Chamulimba health post. The handover ceremony was a momentous occasion, attended by esteemed dignitaries, including the Lusaka Provincial Minister, District Governor, Immediate Past District Governor, and Board and Vice Board Chairpersons for LIAZ.

The event was further dignified by the presence of Ms. Sarah Buki, the LCIF Global Grants Specialist, along with several senior government officials. The gathering celebrated the culmination of efforts to establish the Chamulimba health post, a vital addition to the healthcare infrastructure aimed at serving the local community.

Amidst speeches, ceremonies, and expressions of gratitude, the opening ceremony symbolized a collaborative effort between government authorities, LIAZ, and other stakeholders. It underscored the collective commitment to improving access to healthcare services and enhancing the well-being of individuals in the region.

The inauguration of the Chamulimba health post stands as a testament to the power of partnership and collective action in addressing healthcare challenges and fostering community development.

Mike's life revolved around caring for Emmanuel, a responsibility he could never leave behind, compounded by his unemployment and the inability to afford the necessary treatment.

One fateful day, fate whispered news of a program that bestowed free eye care and treatment upon children with visual impairments. This initiative bore the benevolent imprint of the government and Lions Aid, an organization fervently dedicated to enhancing the lives of those with disabilities. 61 YEAR OLD IREEN EXPRESSES GRATITUDE FOR THE NEWLY CONSTRUCTED KAYUMWEYUMWE SCHOOL



Ireen Chiluma is a 61-year-old farmer who lives in Kayumweyumuwe, a rural community in Mumbwa District of Zambia. She has seen many changes in her life, but none more significant than the construction of the school and staff house in her village. She remembers how hard it was for her children to get an education, especially once they reached grade 4 as they had to walk for more than three hours every day to reach the nearest school as the school could only go up to grade 4. Many of them dropped out or got pregnant along the way. She also remembers how the teachers who came to teach in her village had no place to stay.

But now, things are different. Thanks to the government and Lions Aid, her community has a school that can accommodate up to grade 7 students, and a staff house that can house two teachers and their families. She is proud of her children who can now learn and grow in a safe and comfortable environment. She is also grateful to the teachers who are dedicated and motivated to teach in her village. She sees them as role models and friends for her community.

She knows that these projects are not only for her benefit, but for the future of her community. She wants to make sure that they are well maintained and respected by everyone. She urges her fellow community members to take care of the school and staff house, and to avoid any vandalism or misuse. She also encourages them to support the teachers and students, and to participate in the school activities.

She has a message for the government and Lions Aid, who have made these projects possible. She wants to thank them for their generosity and kindness, and to ask them to continue their good work. She hopes that they will expand the school to include grade 8 and higher, so that her children can complete their education without having to leave their village or move long distances. She also hopes that they will employ local people in the construction and maintenance of the projects, so that they can benefit from the employment opportunities.

Ireen Chiluma is a happy woman who loves her community and her country. She believes that education is the key to development and prosperity. She dreams of a day when every child in Kayumweyumuwe can have access to quality education and a bright future.

Dr Chipalo-Mutati, who is a renowned ophthalmologist, said this in response to the assertion by Ms Martha Nanyangwe, an Ophthalmic Nurse of Mansa General Hospital (MGH) that she gets her inspiration from her. This was after staff at the Mansa General Hospital (MGH) eye department celebrated Martha for doing exceptionally well in eye care service delivery, especially relating to patient education, a move that enhances the uptake of eye care services among patients.

Celebrating women for their contribution in various fields has over the years become a crucial component aimed at motivating them as well as displaying and emphasizing the significant role they play, thereby making the world appreciate the women’s contribution.

Head of the eye department at MGH Dr. Chisanga Chelu said Martha’s exemplary performance has mostly been propelled by the support that the eye department has been receiving from LIAZ since 2020, thanks to Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF). He pointed out that the provision of appropriate equipment, consumables, human resource capacity building and infrastructure enhancement has created a conducive environment for growth among staff.

And Martha, one of the three female Ophthalmic Nurses in Luapula Province said her passion for eye care service delivery is inspired by Dr Grace Chipalo-Mutati whose work has been recognize locally and abroad. “I have not personally met Dr Grace Chipalo-Mutati, but I have read and heard so much about her achievements and so I aspire to follow her footsteps in the world of ophthalmology” Martha said.

Key among Martha’s significant contributions include conducting minor eye surgeries and patient education. “Apart from the usual tasks, I always take pleasure in talking to most of the patients, giving them information such as the importance of regular eye exams, proper eye care, and the prevention of eye diseases among others.” Martha explained.

Other roles that Martha was celebrated for include assisting in eye examinations, taking patient histories, measuring visual acuity and administering eye drops. She also ensures the ophthalmologist has all the necessary information to make an accurate diagnosis. Additionally, Martha assists in preparation of all instruments required for surgery in the theatre.

Eye health is an essential aspect of overall health and well-being and the role of women ophthalmic staff in promoting eye health cannot be overstated as their contribution to the field is invaluable. 

