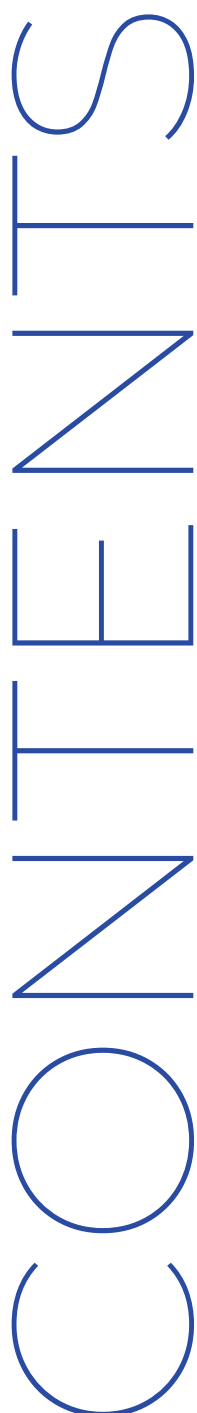

Over the past year, we have witnessed remarkable progress across various projects aimed at enhancing healthcare access, improving education quality, and fostering community development. Notable highlights were the launch of several initiatives including the Western Province Comprehensive Eye Care Project, the Reach Project, and Water, Sanitation, Hygiene and Education (WASHE) stakeholder capacity building in both Western and Northwestern provinces. Additionally, we completed infrastructure improvements at Kayumweyumwe Primary School in Mumbwa District by handing over staff houses along with water and sanitation facilities. These initiatives exemplify our steadfast commitment to addressing pressing social needs within targeted areas.

This year marked a continuation of our efforts to support the Ministry of Health (MoH) in preventing avoidable blindness through comprehensive eye health services provided across 100 districts. Our outreach programs successfully screened over 81,110 individuals while restoring sight to an impressive 3,170 eyes. Further we trained 3,986 of WASHe Stakeholders. These initiatives resulted in LIAZ collectively contributing over Twenty million kwacha (ZMW20 million).

Moving forward the Board, acting at the behest of the Lions District 413, resolved to establish the Melvin Jones Eye Hospital (MJEH), a strategic initiative designed to sustain and expand our ongoing efforts in combating avoidable blindness across Zambia. This decision underscores a critical response to Zambia's public health challenge, where blindness remains a pervasive issue particularly among older populations. By developing a specialized facility dedicated to eye care, the Board aims to enhance service delivery and ensure continuity in addressing this pressing concern. The MJEH represents not only an infrastructural investment but also a reaffirmation of commitment towards improving eye care outcomes in Zambia.

Lastly I wish to re-echo our gratitude to the Lions fraternity in Zambia and world over, strategic partners, funding agencies, the Board and management for your unwavering commitment and tireless efforts.

Happy reading and remember together, we possess the power to create positive change and transform lives.

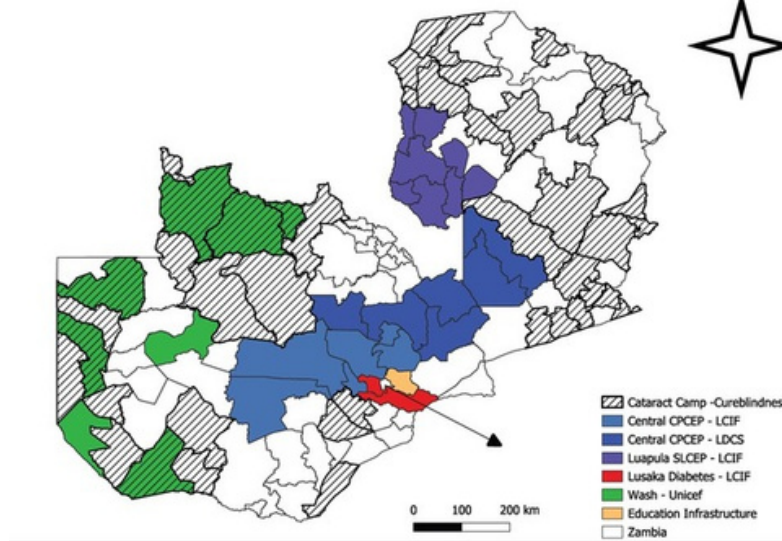

Comprehensive and Inclusive Eye Care Programme

Our comprehensive and inclusive eye health program is dedicated to supporting service activities that combat blindness and preventable vision loss, while also assisting individuals who are blind or visually impaired. Grounded in Helen Keller's call for Lions to be the "Knights of the Blind," our initiative responds to extensive research highlighting the profound impacts of vision loss on individuals, families, and communities. By targeting vulnerable populations in hard-to-reach areas across Zambia, we aim to address disparities in eye care access and outcomes.

02

Neglected Tropical Diseases with a focus on Trachoma

The Trachoma Elimination Programme is a critical public health initiative aimed at eradicating trachoma, a contagious eye disease that, if left untreated, can lead to irreversible blindness. This programme is founded on the World Health Organization's SAFE strategy, which comprises four essential interventions: Surgery for trichiasis, Antibiotics to eliminate infection, Facial cleanliness promotion, and Environmental improvements. These components collectively work to reduce both individual suffering and community transmission of the disease.

Non-communicable Diseases focusing Diabetes & Childhood Cancer

The program support initiatives that play a crucial role in mitigating the prevalence of diabetes and improving the quality of life for individuals living with the condition. Central to our efforts is the strengthening of health systems to ensure the provision of essential and affordable diabetic services. By enhancing infrastructure, equipping healthcare facilities, and training healthcare workers and volunteers, these initiatives aim to create a sustainable framework that supports effective diabetes management and prevention.

Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene Programme (WASH)

The program support initiatives aimed at developing and sustaining WASH (Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene) infrastructure in health facilities, schools, and other community aggregation centers. It further supports activities that play a crucial role in fostering behavioral change. By ensuring that target communities have access to safe and clean water that is both available and accessible, the program addresses fundamental public health concerns.

Humanitarian Programme

The programme plays a crucial role in alleviating suffering, saving lives, and enhancing the quality of life by supporting interventions that ensure access to basic needs such as primary health, education, shelter, empowerment, and disaster relief. PERFORMANCE



COMPREHENSIVE & INCLUSIVE EYE CARE PROGRAMME

The Comprehensive and Inclusive Eye Care Programme aims to strengthen the delivery of quality eye health services at both primary and secondary levels of care. This is achieved through a multifaceted approach that includes enhancing human resource capacity through scholarships and Continuous Medical Education (CME); equipping health facilities with appropriate diagnostic and curative equipment; increasing community awareness and sensitization; and ensuring the provision of essential medical commodities to support the delivery of free eye care services. The overarching goal of the programme is to prevent avoidable blindness and to promote the rights of individuals who are blind or visually impaired, enabling them to live independent and productive lives.

This year, the programme supported eye health initiatives across Luapula, Northern, Muchinga, Eastern, Central, Western, North-Western, and Southern Provinces, reaching over 100 districts nationwide. Key ongoing projects include the South Luapula Comprehensive Eye Care Project, the Central Province Comprehensive Eye Care Project, and the Strengthening Primary Eye Care Project in Central Province. The programme further broadened its reach with the launch of the Western Province Comprehensive Eye Care Project and Project Reach. These initiatives have been made possible through the generous support of partners, including the Lions Clubs International Foundation, Pyott Foundation, Lavelle Fund for the Blind, Cure Blindness, and Lions Clubs International Multiple District 104E Norway

HUMAN RESOURCE

The programme supported the training of two (2) Ophthalmic Clinical Officers (OCOs) to pursue an Advanced Diploma in Ophthalmology (Cataract Major). This initiative forms part of our ongoing commitment to strengthening human resource capacity within the eye health sector.

By investing in specialized training, the programme seeks to improve the quality and accessibility of eye care services at both primary and secondary levels. The enhanced skills of these professionals will contribute to improved diagnosis, management, and surgical intervention for a wide range of eye conditions, ultimately benefiting underserved communities

SERVICE DELIVERY

A total of 69,650 individuals were screened and treated across 100 districts. The programme facilitated 52 surgical outreach camps, through which 3,170 sight-restoring surgeries primarily cataract procedures were successfully performed. These outreach interventions have significantly improved access to essential eye care services, particularly for underserved and hard-to-reach communities, contributing to the reduction of avoidable blindness.

COMPREHENSIVE & INCLUSIVE EYE CARE PROGRAMME

COMMUNITY AWARENESS AND SENSITIZATION

To improve understanding and dispel myths about eye health, various strategies for sharing information and raising awareness were implemented.

Awareness meetings were conducted with traditional and civic leaders to ensure they were well-informed and empowered to serve as advocates for the programme within their respective communities. In addition, radio programmes were supported as a key platform for public education. These programmes featured health workers who provided information on common eye conditions, their treatment, and prevention. They also included cataract champions who shared personal testimonies on how their lives had improved following surgery, while encouraging others with similar conditions to seek care from qualified health facilities.

In collaboration with the Ministry of Health (MoH) and other partners, Information, Education, and Communication (IEC) materials were developed. These materials were produced in both English and local languages and strategically distributed in high-traffic public areas.

Furthermore, the programme commemorated World Sight Day and World Glaucoma Day using the occasion to advocate for the prioritization of eye health services, including increased budget allocation

WATER SANITATION AND HEALTH EDUCATION (WASHE)

The WASH Capacity Building Project was implemented across eight districts namely Kaoma, Mongu, Kalabo, Shangombo, Solwezi, Kalumbila, Mwinilunga, and Zambezi with the objective of strengthening district-level capacity for improved operation and maintenance of water points.

The project strengthened institutional structures at both district and sub-district levels through targeted capacity-building initiatives. A total of 372 Village Water, Sanitation and Hygiene Education (VWASHE) Committees, 63 Environmental Health Technicians (EHTs) and 66 Area Pump Menders (APMs) were trained in operation and maintenance, data management and reporting.

The project further supported a multi-level monitoring system at provincial, district, and sub-district levels to assess performance and strengthen accountability. Monitoring activities covered EHTs, APMs, VWASHEs, and District Water, Sanitation and Hygiene Education (DWASHE) structures. This resulted in improved management and functionality of water points, and enhanced coordination among stakeholders.

DWASHE quarterly review meetings were conducted across all eight districts as well as PWASHE meetings at provincial level. The project support programme review and closure meetings in Solwezi and Mongu providing a platform to review overall project performance, identify sustainability challenges and discuss future strategies.

The Competency Model was successfully deployed, and it demonstrated progressive improvements in VWASHE performance leading to sustain availability of clean water. The project further supported community awareness initiatives, including the commemoration of: World Water Day, World Toilet Day and Global Handwashing Day. These events were held in Shangombo, Kalabo, Kalumbila, and Mwinilunga districts, with participation from senior government officials and key stakeholders. Community engagement activities conducted in the lead-up to these events included radio programmes, community announcements, mobile public address campaigns and drama performances demonstrating the promotion of hygiene and sanitation practices

EXPANDING DIABETES SERVICES IN KAFUE & CHILANGA DISTRICTS

The Expanding Diabetes Services in Kafue and Chilanga Districts project continued in 2025, building on the progress made in previous years. Under this initiative, two (2) diabetes clinics at Nangongwe and Kafue General Hospital were successfully renovated to enhance service delivery and improve patient care. In addition, essential consumables were procured and donated to the districts to support the continuity of diabetes screening and management services.

Throughout the implementation period, a total of 53 outreach activities were conducted, during which 11,460 individuals were screened for diabetes and related complications. Furthermore, 22 radio programs were aired to raise public awareness on diabetes prevention, control, and management. The project also provided support to Kafue District in commemorating World Diabetes Day, contributing to the promotion of community engagement and health education on diabetes.

NON-EYE HEALTH PROGRAMMES

HAND OVER OF TWO STAFF HOUSES WATER RETICULATION SYSTEM AND ABLUTION BLOCK KAYUMWEYUMWE PRIMARY SCHOOL

On 24 July 2024, Lions Aid Zambia (LIAZ) successfully handed over key infrastructure to the Kayumweyumwe community, including two (2) staff houses, a water reticulation system, and an ablution block. These works represent a continuation of earlier development interventions at the school, which included the construction of two (2) classroom blocks, one additional staff house, and a borehole to provide access to clean and safe drinking water.

These recent developments build on prior investments made in November 2019, when a health centre was established within the community. The facility comprises one (1) staff house, one (1) rural health post, two (2) VIP toilets, one (1) incinerator, and a borehole.

Collectively, these initiatives—funded by the Australian Government, Lions Norway, and the Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF)—were implemented by LIAZ at a total cost of ZMW 2,799,471, significantly improving access to essential education and healthcare services in the community.

The handover ceremony was attended by a range of dignitaries, including government and traditional leaders from Mumbwa District. The Honourable Credo Nankuwa, Member of Parliament for Mumbwa Central, was represented by the Council Chairperson, Mr. Charlie Masumo, who served as Guest of Honour. Chief Manoo was represented by his Senior Headwoman, Mercy Mokola (Musefu). Also in attendance were the Lions Club International District 413 Governor, Mr. Welly Chikuka, and LIAZ Board Member, Mr. Emmanuel Kangwa, among other stakeholders.

The ceremony, marked by speeches and expressions of appreciation, highlighted the strong collaboration between government authorities, LIAZ, and its partners. It underscored a shared commitment to improving access to quality education and healthcare services, thereby contributing to the overall well-being and socio-economic development of the Kayumweyumwe community.

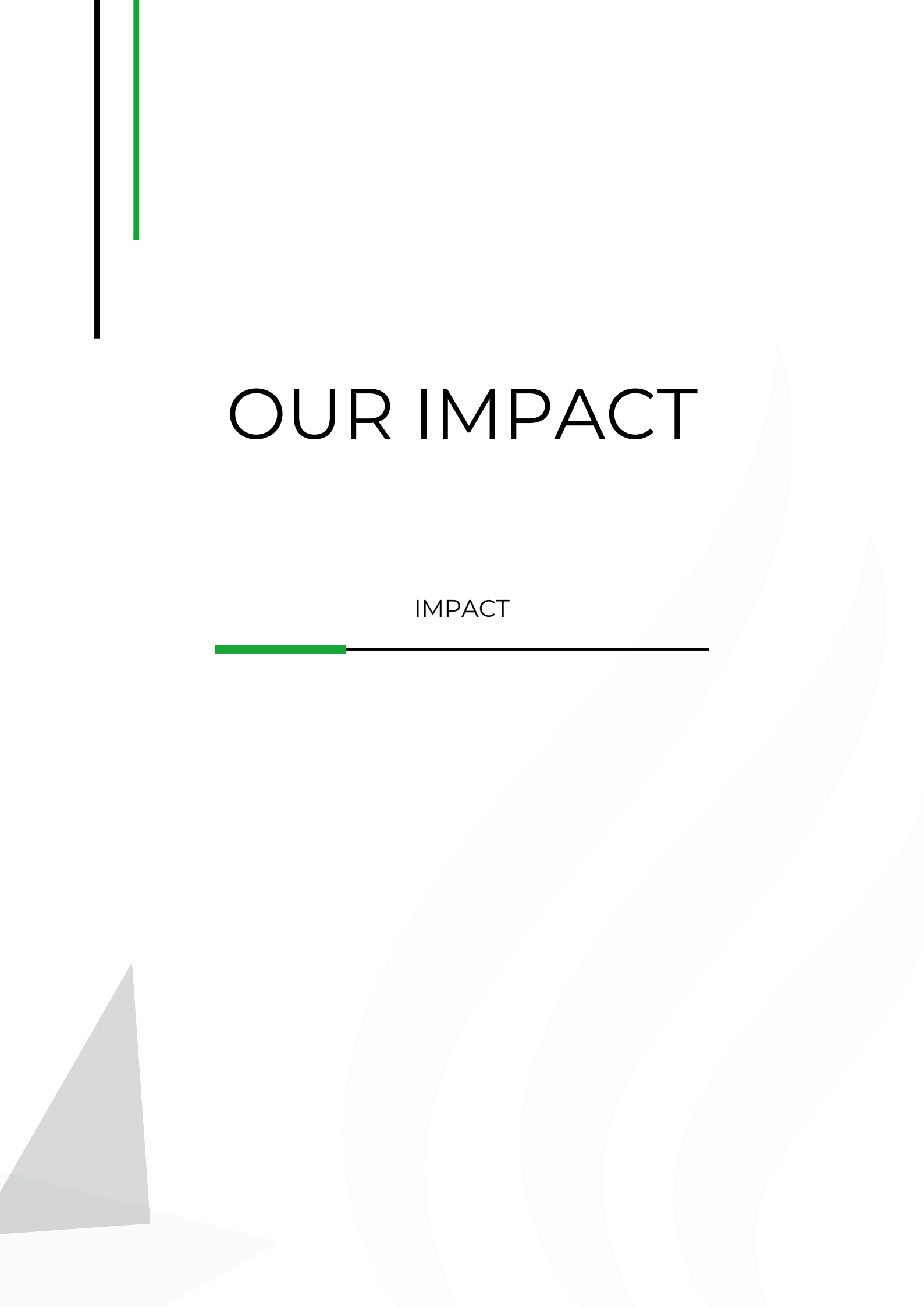

TRANSFORMING LIVES IN NDAPULA: A DECADE OF IMPACT THROUGH EDUCATION AND HEALTH SUPPORT

Ndapula Community has been under the support of Lions Aid Zambia since 2013. Over the years, significant developments have taken place to improve access to education and health services in the area. The community has benefited from the construction of a 1x2 and 1x3 classroom block, along with two staff houses for the school. In 2016, further support was extended through the establishment of a rural health centre and two additional staff houses. This year, the health centre received a solar power system to ensure a stable electricity supply and enhance service delivery.

The Head Teacher, Mr. Evaristo Sichilima, expressed deep gratitude for the continued support provided to the school and the community. He highlighted that the expansion of the school has played a crucial role in reducing early marriages among girls. Previously, Ndapula School only offered education up to Grade 7. Pupils wishing to continue to Grade 8 or 9 had to travel approximately three hours on foot to the nearest school. Many young girls were forced to rent rooms near those schools without proper supervision, placing them at risk and leading many into early marriages. The construction of additional classrooms has enabled Ndapula School to offer education up to Grade 9, giving girls a safer path to continue their education.

Lyndse Nachilima, a former pupil who attended the school from 2013 to 2017, recalls studying in a temporary thatched classroom that leaked whenever it rained. She expressed gratitude for the transformation brought about by the new infrastructure, noting that the improved facilities have given children better learning opportunities. Lyndse is now pursuing a Diploma in Environmental Health at Evelyn Hone College, and she hopes the school will continue to receive support to uplift more children in the community.

Another community member, Ms. Belita Tick, shared her experience of life before the establishment of the rural health centre. Expectant mothers used to walk about three hours to access medical services, discouraging many from attending antenatal check-ups or delivering at health facilities. This led to frequent home births and a high rate of neonatal deaths. She expressed joy that, with the construction of the Ndapula Rural Health Centre, mothers and children now have access to essential services such as antenatal care, safe deliveries, and under-five clinics within their own community.

ELIZABETH HANGOMA - RESTORING HOPE THROUGH SIGHT

Elizabeth Hangoma, a 10-year-old girl from Mumbwa District, began experiencing changes in her vision at the age of three. Her family and those around her noticed that she often bumped into objects and frequently fell, even during the day. Over time, her condition worsened, making it difficult for her to perform simple tasks that most children her age could easily manage.



Her mother became her constant caregiver, responsible for assisting Elizabeth in nearly every aspect of daily life. She spoke of feeling confined, unable to leave her daughter alone for extended periods, and losing hope that her child would ever regain her sight.

After some time, she visited Mumbwa District Hospital, where she was informed that Elizabeth might be able to regain her vision if seen by specialists in Lusaka. Though this news brought renewed hope, she was also worried about the financial implications of the travel and surgery. It was then that a staff member at the hospital introduced her to the Lions Aid Zambia Program, which provides free treatment and support for children in need of eye care.

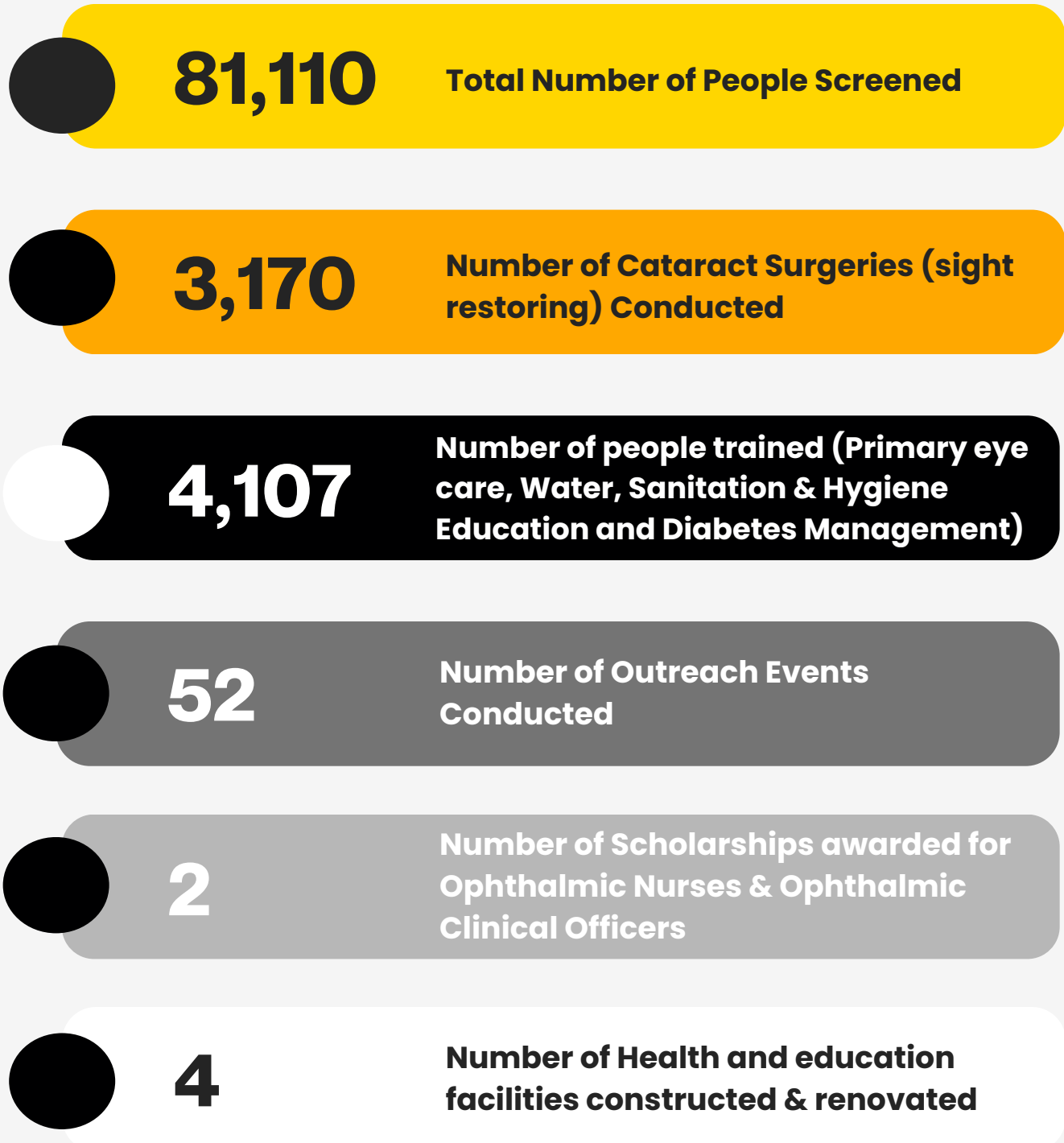
Through this program, Elizabeth was scheduled for surgery. Following the procedure, her mother shared her immense joy and relief, noting that her daughter could now see clearly. Elizabeth has since returned to playing freely with her friends and helps her mother with household chores. Her mother expressed deep gratitude to Lions Aid Zambia for restoring not only her daughter's sight but also hope for their family's future.

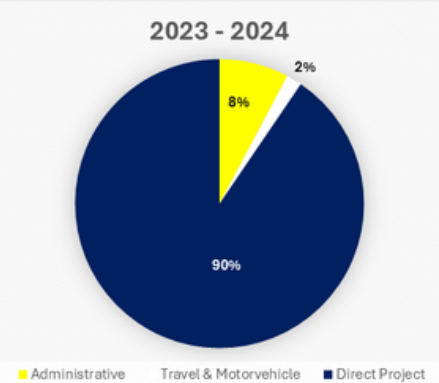
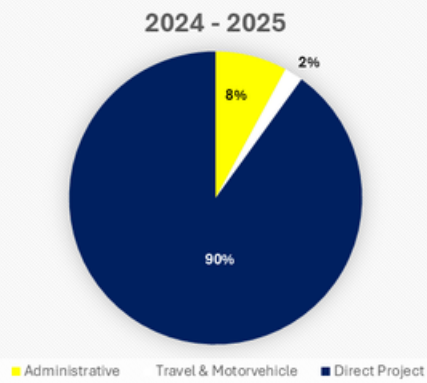

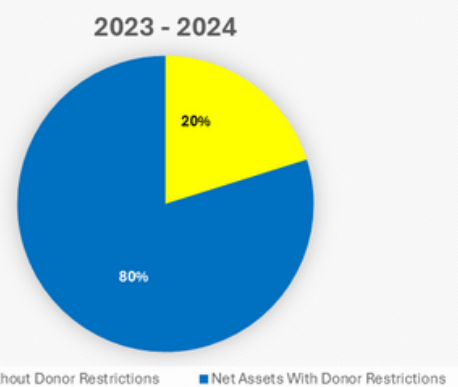
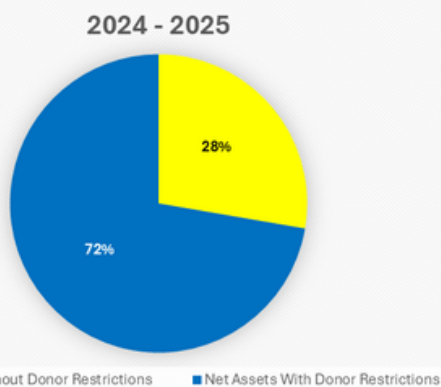
INCOME BY FISCAL YEAR

MELVIN JONES EYE HOSPITAL

A BRIGHTER FUTURE FOR ZAMBIA'S VISION



The Melvin Jones Eye Hospital (MJEH), set to commence operations at Plot JES 151 along Mwambula Road, Jesmondine, Lusaka, represents a pivotal advancement in addressing Zambia's significant burden of avoidable blindness. As a 20-bed capacity facility incorporating inpatient, outpatient, and theatre departments, MJEH will function as a social enterprise and as a division of LIAZ.

This initiative is designed to deliver comprehensive eye health services through both static hospital-based care and community outreach programs, thereby extending its reach to underserved populations who traditionally face barriers to accessing quality eye care. The hospital aims to serve a minimum of 6,000 patients annually in its formative years, directly confronting the prevalence of blindness estimated at 2% (389,200 people) in those aged 50 years and above, of which 80% are avoidable.

The strategic location in Jesmondine area positions MJEH within proximity to densely populated urban and peri-urban communities where eye health services remain limited. With a budget of USD 877,000, the project underscores a commitment not only to infrastructure development but also to sustainable service delivery models tailored for long-term impact.

This initiative builds on prior successes by LIAZ in restoring sight to over 11,000 eyes among them children and adults, while addressing leading causes of blindness such as cataracts through early detection and treatment interventions.
